

Week 28 Geese In A Row

Note: all seam allowances are ¼" unless other wise stated

Cutting Instructions – use dark, medium and lights for this block

			6"	12"
Geese	Fabric 1 Fabric 2	4 4	2" x 3 ½" 2" x 3 ½"	3 ½" x 6 ½" 3 ½" x 6 ½"
Background	Light	16	2" x 2"	3 ½" x 3 ½"

Note: I have used two fabrics for the Geese in the 12" block and a selection of eight different fabrics in the 6" block.


## **Putting It Together**

- 1. Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the **Background** 2 " (3 ½") squares
- Right sides together lay a **Background** square on a **Fabric 1** 2" x 3½" (3 ½" 6½") rectangle, as shown on page 2.

Sew on the diagonal line. Trim away  $\frac{1}{4}$  from the seam, fold the square back and press. Check that your rectangle is still 2 " x 3  $\frac{1}{2}$  (3  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 6  $\frac{1}{2}$ ").

2. Right sides together lay a **Background** square on a **Fabric 1** 2" x 3½" (3 ½" 6½") rectangle, as shown below.

Sew on the diagonal line. Trim away  $\frac{1}{4}$  from the seam, fold the square back and press. Check that your rectangle is still 2 " x 3  $\frac{1}{2}$  (3  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 6  $\frac{1}{2}$ ")



Repeat this step on the other side of the rectangle with **Background** 2 " (3 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>") square.


3. Carefully trim your Flying Geese units to **2**" **x 3** ½" **(3** ½" **x 6** ½")

## Note \* You must have this overlap at the top of your Flying Geese unit.

4. Repeat these steps to make **eight** flying geese units.

Now you have all your Flying Geese Blocks made, time to put it all together. Join four geese together as shown below. Repeat with the remaining four.

Then sew the two rows together with the geese as shown below. Take care to butt your seams so your points all meet.



Well done, another block made. Press well and check that your block measures  $6 \frac{1}{2}$ " x  $6 \frac{1}{2}$ " (12  $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 12  $\frac{1}{2}$ ")

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
